New Biz Helping Moms - INFANT INSTINCTS

We all know how important it is to have a healthy immune system, so how important is it for infants to get a good start from the beginning? Those early days can be challenging for new moms, but thanks to Jessica Hopp, the owner of Infant Instincts in Orangevale, soon-to-be moms and new moms can rest assured that there is an expert who can help them with their prenatal breastfeeding education and postnatal challenges too!

"Growing up, I always loved babies," said Jessica Hopp, Board Certified Lactation Consultant, "I was a nanny for over 12 years and after hearing all about breastfeeding challenges, I wanted to know more, which is what prompted me to change my major in college and pursue becoming a specialist in lactation education. It's my passion!"

After working as an outpatient lactation consultant for UC Davis, Jessica wanted to go out on her own and provide a broader range of services, including holistic approaches to many of the issues facing mothers. She wanted to focus on "adding the nurturing touch to the clinical services", via natural remedies. Her dream was to live and work in her community and fill the void, helping moms with their new infant care needs.

"It was important to me to do this in my community and offer services to help all moms who need support. I wanted them to feel that they are not alone," Jessic said shared, "Having problems after childbirth can be so stressful and intensified due to hormones making the situation seem worse. I want to be there for them, with tried and true solutions to their postnatal problems. They need to know that there is someone to help with their fears and concerns."

The methods that Jessica uses are clinically tested and she's had fantastic results helping moms with adjustments that make a big difference. One of her most gratifying moments is when she fixes a problem like "latching on correctly" and the

mom breathes a sigh of relief and says, "Oh, this is how it's supposed to feel!"

Part of Jessica's success is that she can spend the amount of time needed to address each individual's situation. Typically an appointment with her is about 90 minutes long in comparison to just a few minutes working with a nurse after delivery. The CDC recommends breastfeeding beyond the early weeks and urges exclusively breastfeeding for 6 months and then up to 12 months. The good news is now insurance companies are now required to cover lactation support including supplying a breast pump, providing lactation consultations, and prenatal education. This includes Jessica's services

"I help working moms by discussing their goals and making a plan," said Jessica, "Returning to work can be a stressful thing. I try to break it down and make it achievable."

Some of the most common problems new moms experience are stress, anxiety, and pain.

"There shouldn't be pain when nurs-

ing," Jessica shared, "The two most common causes are a shallow latch or infant oral issues like tongue ties or suck coordination."

Another common issue is the infant having tension or stress, which can be relieved with techniques as simple as infant massage and stretches. "I get a good mix of first time moms who don't know what to expect. I also get moms who have had a difficult time previously and want to get ahead of the curve on their next pregnancy," Jessica said, "Although you may be successful with one baby, each birth and nursing situation is different and that's where I come in to help."

Just Say No to Drug Rehab Center on Santa Juanita Avenue

Help us "Just Say NO!" to a new drug rehab center on Santa Juanita Avenue. New owners in our idyllic stretch of Orangevale have informed longtime residents, schools, and business owners of their intentions to build a Drug Rehab/Detox Facility in our neighborhood. The 5 acre parcel was previously an Alzheimer's facility, and has been all but vacant for 7+ years. The new owners are in the process of acquiring a new license for their Drug Rehab Center. All residents I have connected with are against this proposal, and have voiced their concerns to the new owners. Our voices have been met with responses that range from dismissive, to downright arrogant. From what I have gathered from Sacramento County, they do not have permits to be building yet, yet construction is well underway.

Less than 150 ft from this property resides Odyssey Learning Center, a SJUSD school for children with disabilities. Directly across the street from Odyssey is OHP, a well established and beloved Pre-K school. Two houses from OHP rest our third school within a quarter mile radius from this upsetting proposal, Ottoman Elementary.

Please join us in your support to stop this heinous proposal. Join us at our local Orangevale CPAC meeting at the Orangevale Community Center on 6/6/23 at 6 pm to make sure your voices are heard and your presence is seen!! If you have information or concern, I also urge you to file a report or complaint with our local agencies listed below.

The more of us that speak up, the less likely it is that our new neighbors will be successful in their endeavors to prioritize their personal profits over existing residents' security, and financial stability. In addition to jeopardizing the safety of all three schools, this proposed project threatens to steal equity from all surrounding home owners and put clouds on all our homes' titles. In the meantime, I am confident in asserting that the new owners on Santa Juanita Avenue have already stolen our peace of mind. For all

those who are reading, please be assured that we intend to fight this with every fiber of our being.

WHEREAS, the Board of Directors (the

"Board") of the Orangevale Recreation and Park District, County of Sacramento, State of California, has previously ordered through Resolution 92-06-51 the formation of an assessment district pursuant to the provisions of the Landscaping and Lighting Act of 1972 for the purpose of financing certain park and recreation improvements and refurbishments as specified in the District's updated Master Plan and for the purpose of funding maintenance operations of the District; and WHEREAS, the Board, through Resolution 92-06-51, has ordered that the park and recreation improvements specified in the Engineer's Report dated March 26, 1992, be constructed, and has estimated that the cost of such proposed park and recreation improvements is greater than can be raised from a single annual assessment, and has ordered that the estimated costs of these improvements be raised by an assessment levied and collected in annual installments over a period of 20 years, commencing in fiscal year 1992-93 and ending in fiscal year 2012-13 and then continued from year to year as necessary to fund other capital, maintenance and other needs;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RE-SOLVED, by the Board of Directors of the Orangevale Recreation and Park District, County of Sacramento, State of California, that:

- 1. On July 17, 1991, by its Resolution No. 816, this Board ordered the formation of and levied the first assessment within the Orangevale Recreation and Park District Maintenance Assessment District 1991 (the "Assessment District") pursuant to the provisions of the Landscaping and Lighting Act of 1972.
- 2. On February 16, 2023 this Board adopted Resolution No. 23-02-699, A Resolution Directing Preparation of the 2023-24 Annual Report for the Oran-

gevale Recreation and Park District Maintenance Assessment District. Pursuant to this resolution, SCI Consulting Group, the Engineer of Work, prepared a report in accordance with Article XIIID of the California Constitution and Section 22565, et seq., of the California Streets and Highways Code (the "Report"). The Report has been made, filed with the Clerk of the Board and duly considered by the Board and is hereby deemed sufficient and preliminarily approved. The Report shall stand as the Engineer's Report for all subsequent proceedings under and pursuant to the foregoing resolution.

3. It is the intention of this Board to levy and collect assessments within the Assessment District for fiscal year 2023-24. Within the Assessment District, the existing and proposed improvements, and any substantial changes proposed to be made to the existing improvements. are generally described as installation, maintenance and servicing of public recreational facilities and improvements, including, but not limited to, turf and play areas, landscaping, ground cover, shrubs and trees, irrigation systems, drainage systems, lighting, fencing, entry monuments, basketball courts, tennis courts, gymnasium, running tracks, swimming pools, other recreational facilities, security patrols to protect the Improvements, graffiti removal and repainting, and labor, materials, supplies, utilities and equipment. as applicable, at each of the locations owned, operated or maintained by the Orangevale Recreation and Park District. 4. The Assessment District consists of the lots and parcels shown on the boundary map of the Assessment District on file with the Clerk of the Board of the Orangevale Recreation and Park District, and reference is hereby made to such map for further particulars.

5. Reference is hereby made to the Engineer's Report for a full and detailed description of the improvements, the boundaries of the Assessment District and the proposed assessments upon assessable lots and parcels of land within the Assessment District. The Engineer's Report identifies all parcels which will have a special benefit conferred upon them and upon which an assessment will be imposed.

6. The assessments are not proposed to increase from the previous year's assessments. The Board of Directors declares its intent to levy and collect assessments for the fiscal year 2023-24 within said dis-
