

> Orangevale Park Development

Over 40 years ago the Orangevale Recreation &Park District developed plans for the area from Hazel Avenue to Filbert Avenue along Oak Avenue which residents enjoy today. Early 1984 in public hearings there were several activities that Orangevale residents wanted to see in this park, such as an expanded riding arena, an 18-hole Disc Golf course, a nature area, and a shaded play area for children.

Orangevale's then librarian, Dorothy Kilgore, headed a committee that requested 24

acres of the park at the corner of Hazel and Oak Avenues be set aside as a nature area. She noted that natural habitat areas were becoming increasingly endangered by growth from the building of many housing tracts and industrialization of adjoining cities of Roseville and Folsom. One thing everyone present was in favor of was saving the phenomenal oak woodland and retain it in its natural state for posterity and passive recreation that requires no development such as walking and horseback riding.

In August of 1984, the Park District had finished with the installation of a 20-station exercise course in park. The course was designed by Park Superintendent Chuck West after the park board applied for and received a Wells Fargo grant sponsoring the program. The program, which can be as challenging as one wants to make it. was built to meet the needs of adults and senior citizens. The area can be walked or jogged and is one and seven tenths of a mile in length. A large sign with big print lays out the game-field map at the first station. Special features of the course include two drinking fountains; a well lit path that can be safely used in the evening; a jogging extension: two stations to take a pulse rate; and a means of scoring one's performance by measuring the number of exercise repetitions at the different stations The stations were constructed of California redwood and designed to be used by two people at the same time, if desired. There is also a stretching and warm-up area, followed by stations grouped in threes and separated by stretches that can be jogged or walked. Four cool down and stretch stations at end the course.

The stations have been updated, all made of metal with five stations which includes a sit up bench, a tai chi station, an upright bicycle, a vertical press, and a back extension station. The course is located close to the playground area on the Oak Avenue side of the park where parents can watch their children play in the playground area while going through the course. Other improvements made include a new familystyle barbecue and grill in the reservation picnic area. This area is now covered for shade.

Following nine years of hard work and planning in 1992, the Orangevale Recreation and Park District dedicated the nature trail at the Orangevale Community Park and opened it to public use. The project was a culmination of work from community members, students from Casa Roble Fundamental High School. and included Maxine Cornwell, Dorothy Kilgore and Virginia Zbur who fought to keep the 28 acres from being turned into residential dwellings. The original design for the nature trail was done by Gail Ervin and the Orangevale Lion's Club provided funding for the trail markers with the majority of funding coming from a grant from the California Wildlife.

Coastal Parkland Conservation Act of 1988 with the remaining costs provided by ORPD.

The walking trail is also wheelchair accessible. Along this trail you can observe then new sign identifying the California Central Railroad that went through Orangevale in the 1860's. This sign was designed by the Orangevale History Project and funded by the Rotary Club of Orangevale and Elegant Design Construction of Fair Oaks. As Orangevale residents we thank the planners for their foresight 40 years ago as we all enjoy the Orangevale Community Park today.

BOBBIE'S CHOPPED SUMMER SALAD

Salad:

can corn, drained
 can black beans, drained
 and rinsed
 green onion, chopped
 cucumber, chopped
 tomato, chopped or cherry
 tomatoes, halved
 avocados, diced gently
 Dressing:

¹/₄ cup olive oil
¹/₄ cup red wine vinegar
1 tsp cumin
2 tsp garlic, minced
¹/₂ tsp salt, or to taste
¹/₂ tsp pepper, or to taste

Place salad ingredients in a large bowl. Mix ingredients for dressing in a small bowl. Add dressing to salad ingredients and gently toss together.

You can eat this as a salad or you can serve with tortilla chips as a dip.






Orangevale Outlaws U9 Baseball Team Competes in National Travel Ball Tournament in Reno, NV

The youth 9 years old and under "Outlaws" baseball team from Orangevale recently competed in the Reno-Tahoe Nationals Baseball Tournament. There were over 30 teams from all parts of the country that participated. The Outlaws fared well in their qualifying round beating teams from Hawaii and Nevada. They won their first game in the championship bracket but were defeat-

ed in the semifinals by a hometown team from Reno. The Outlaws represented Orangevale well and put OV on the map for all those who saw them play.

REMM AND HATCH VOTED TO DIVISION III SOFTBALL ALL-ECAC TEAM

DANBURY, CT – Alfred University was one of five teams that had two members of the Division III Softball All-Eastern Collegiate Athletic Conference (ECAC) Team on Tuesday afternoon.

The Saxons were joined by DeSales University, Farmingdale State, Springfield College and Wavnesburg University as the only schools that had two recipients of the honor.

AU was represented by Jessica Remm (Carmel, IN/ Carmel) as an All-ECAC outfielder and Arden Hatch (Orangevale, CA/St. Francis) as an All-ECAC pitcher. Remm and Hatch were joined by Utica University's Emily Joss as the only members of the Empire 8 out of the 13-player selection.

Hatch was also named the Empire 8 Pitcher of the Year, becoming the second Saxon in school history to earn the accolade, joining Jessica Wilcox '21. Hatch led the conference with a .209 opposing batting average while striking out 123 batters. She ended the season with a career-best 13-4 overall record while maintaining a 2.66 ERA. Hatch put together no-hitter performances against both Fredonia and Russell Sage

during the spring season. She ended her collegiate career with 329 career strikeouts, which ranks third in program history. Hatch additionally received All-Empire 8 First Team honors.

Remm became the third Saxon in a row and fourth in school history to be named an Empire 8 Rookie of the Year, joining Meghan Neto (Miami, FL/Doral Academy Charter) and Mya Wells (San Ramon, CA/California) in the streak. Remm was fourth in the Empire 8 with a .411 batting average, totaling 58 hits and a conference-high 44 RBI. The 58 hits for Remm are the fourth-highest total in a single season in program history for Alfred University, while her 44 RBI ties for the third-highest mark. She was responsible for 13 doubles, two triples, and two home runs this spring for the Saxons. In the outfield, Remm put together a .967 fielding percentage that included 55 putouts. She additionally received All-Empire 8 First Team recognition.

Both Remm and Hatch earned National Fastpitch Coaches Association (NFCA) Division III All-Region III Third Team. Both were also named to the All-Empire 8 First Team.

HARRIS CENTER FOR THE ARTS is excited to present Country music legend Lonestar on Sunday, July 30, at 7:30 pm. Not every musician has the opportunity to revisit and even potentially improve upon their biggest hits. But on the forthcoming TEN to 1 album, the award-winning band Lonestar-Dean Sams (keyboards, acoustic guitar, background vocals), Michael Britt (lead guitarist, background vocals), Keech Rainwater (drums) and Drew Womack (lead vocals, guitar)—are taking a fresh look at all 10 of their chart-topping country songs.

This streak started in 1996 with the band's second single, the rock-edged "No News," and continued with the following year's "Come Cryin' to Me" and "Everything's Changed." The band's quadruple-platinum 1999 album Lonely Grill spawned four No. 1 hits (including the beloved global smash "Amazed") and established Lonestar as music's preeminent pop-country band-a status they'd maintain through the 2000s and beyond, thanks to songs full of energy and creative lyrics ("What About Now") and ("Mr. Mom"), along with heartfelt messages and soaring melodies ("I'm Already There").

With these re-recordings, the band members were mindful of

striking a balance between preserving the sonic elements fans were familiar with—and not repeating them. "It was a high wire act trying to figure out how to change it a little bit and not throw people off too much," Britt says. "I've seen bands that when they do the big hits that I know, and they change it up too much, I feel disappointed. I think people want to sing along—the vocal melody is what people really are latching onto the majority of time.

"That's what was in everybody's minds when we were trying to come up with different arrangements, was trying to keep the vocal melody true," he continues. "Don't change it so much that people go, 'That's not even the same song.""

As a result, many of Lonestar's re-recordings have merely cosmetic updates and changes. "Mr. Mom" is "a little bit more country-sounding," Britt says, while Sams created some loops for "Smile" to "make it more modern-feeling, and have a little more motion," he says. "It's a little bigger-sounding than what the original record is. We kept most of the songs pretty close to the originals, but with just more updated, modern sounds."

The changes to "Amazed," meanwhile, reflect the power ballad's status as an exclamation mark during concerts. "Since it's usually the biggest part or finale of the show, we've made it a little bit more bombastic," Britt says. "We didn't want to change it so much as just to make it more epic."

Fittingly, TEN to 1 record reflects the ways Lonestar's hits have evolved over the years during the band's rousing, highenergy concerts. Such talent has contributed to the band winning many of music's top honors, including Academy of Country Music Awards for New Vocal Group in 1996, Single and Song of The Year in 2000, along with Humanitarian of The Year in 2002. They also won Country Music Association's Vocal Group of the Year and International Artist Achievement award in 2001. All told, Lonestar have sold more than 10.5 million records since their formation.

With the release of TEN to 1 record, the band members are full of gratitude for what they've accomplished already, and excited about what the future holds. "It's amazing that we're still standing and putting on great shows after all these years," Sams says. "The fans are still coming out to our shows night after night, to see us and hear our music. That's almost 30 vears of touring, and I can't tell you how grateful I am ---and I've never once taken it for granted." 
