





ORANGEVALE POST OF-FICE/MAIL DELIVERY (1891-1930)

It was reported in August 1891 that "A post office has been granted to Orange Vale colony and W. H. Edwards will be appointed postmaster." That post office was operated out of his home on the corner of Chestnut and Central Avenues which became the Wahrhaftig residence (6501 Chestnut). The contract to carry the mail from Folsom to Orange Vale was held by Mrs. Kate Foster who ran a feed stable and horse boarding business in Folsom. At that time, 40 adult residents were receiving mail. In 1892, at the age of 16, Harry L. Landis was the first paid rural carrier between Folsom and Orangevale. Mr. Edwards held that position for two years.

In 1893, Charles Smith took over as postmaster and had the station in his home which was also on Chestnut Avenue. He had a large window in the front of his home taken out and converted into mailboxes so the people could get their mail without entering his home. In 1895, Edith Beauchamp took over for a 4-year term. Postmaster Jay H. Smith was next and while he was not related to Charles Smith, he rented a portion of the Smith home and operated out of the area converted at the front of the house. At some point in the next year numerous mailboxes were placed in Orange Vale for the 'convenient distribution of mail matter." Under those conditions, residents

ceived mail only once a week.

In 1900, the area was assessed to establish a free mail delivery rural route and the post office at Orangevale was abolished. The rural route carrier would pick up mail delivered to Folsom via train from Sacramento and Rural Route #1 between Folsom and Fair Oaks/Orangevale country began on June 4, 1900. This route handled 8,000 pieces of mail matter monthly. J. F. Korte was appointed mail carrier with J. H. Norton as substitute. The route was 23 miles long and for this labor, the carrier was said to be poorly compensated, having to furnish his own rig and keep it in repair, and receiving only \$500 per year.

Boxes were placed at intervals along the line of the route, where mail for those living off the line could post and receive letters and parcels. They could also purchase stamps and procure money orders. Mail for those on the route was addressed to Folsom, Rural Route No. 1. By the following year, the rural carrier also became an agent for the daily Sacramento Bee. Record Union. The Saturday Evening Post and the San Francisco Call papers. At that time, the rate for letters and packages was .02c for first ounce and .02c per additional ounce and the postcard rate was .01c.

By September 1903, house to house service began and C.E. Ward of Orangevale succeeded J. F. Korte as carrier on Route 1. John Hammond Owen took over as mail carrier in May 1905 and many others filled in as carriers between then and 1909 - G.P. Cater, James P. Jones, E. C. Meader, Ray Smith, and Ralph Currier. The position paid \$75 a month. During this time, the wives and children of the carriers would cover the route, as needed.

W. F. Jeffs was next appointed rural letter carrier and became the first to use an automobile on the route. Apparently, road conditions were bad back then, and the route was revised many times because of it. The post office warned Orangevale residents that they were responsible for keeping the rural roads in good condition and unless this was looked after, routes would continue to be revised, making delivery very unpredictable. Mr. Jeffs held the position as carrier for 19 years, purchasing, at his own expense, a Ford touring car in 1923 which allowed for better service on his route. In 1925, it was noticed that a red star was added to his uniform. The red star was awarded only to carriers who had given the government at least 15 years of efficient and satisfactory service. After suffering a stroke in 1929, Mr. Jeffs retired and George Thomas (Tom) Johnston was appointed rural mail carrier in 1930.

THE REAL IMPACT OF GOING GREEN



The Real Impact of Going Green By Sue Frost

As a Sacramento County Supervisor, I prioritize the safety and well-being of our community above all. California's ambitious goal to achieve zero carbon emissions by 2030 is a testament to the state's leadership in addressing climate change.

Among the measures taken to meet this goal, the California Air Resources Board's decision to ban the sale of new gas furnaces and water heaters starting in 2030 stands out. This policy aims to reduce our reliance on fossil fuels, a significant step toward a cleaner, more sustainable future.

However, while the intentions behind such policies are commendable, they often come with unintended consequences. For instance, the largest contributor to modern wildfires in our state is not the appliances in our homes but the highvoltage transmission lines that crisscross our forests. These lines, essential for transporting electricity—much of which is imported due to California's dependence on solar and wind power—pose a significant risk of sparking wildfires.

The ban on single-use plastic bags in 2014 aimed to reduce plastic waste and associated emissions. Yet, a report by the California Public Interest Research Group "CAL-PIRG," found that the amount of discarded plastic bags per capita increased since the ban's implementation. The thicker "reusable" bags, often used once and discarded, have contributed to a nearly 50% rise in plastic waste. This outcome underscores the complexity of environmental policymaking and the need for careful consideration of policy effects.

nia's water management. The lack of investment in water storage and conveyance has exacerbated cycles of floods and droughts, contributing significantly to greenhouse gas emissions. This oversight not only undermines our environmental goals but also affects the state's agricultural productivity and the livelihoods of countless Californians.

The push for electrification, including the expansion of electric vehicle (EV) charging infrastructure, is part of the state's strategy to reduce emissions. However, last summer's heatwave-induced blackouts, which led to restrictions on EV charging, highlighted the fragility of our current electrical grid. These incidents serve as a stark reminder of the challenges we face in transitioning to a more sustainable energy system.

Additionally, the economic impacts of these policies cannot be ignored. The construction industry, for example, has been hit hard by the increased costs associated with meeting new environmental standards, making homeownership even more elusive for many Californians.

The recent controversy over gas appliances and the Berkeley ordinance banning gas infrastructure in new constructions has sparked a heated debate. While the Ninth Circuit Federal Court of Appeals struck down Berkeley's ban, the broader issue of transitioning away from natural gas remains contentious. Many residents and businesses are concerned about the implications of such bans on their daily lives and the economy.

While the state's efforts to combat climate change through ambitious goals like zero carbon emissions by 2030 are laudable, we must also critically assess the broader implications of these policies on our community's safety, well-being, and economic stability. The unintended consequences of well-meaning initiatives, from increased wildfire risks due to overreliance on electric power to the paradoxical rise in plastic waste following bag bans, underscore the need for a more nuanced approach to environmental policymaking.

About the only thing that I can grow well in my garden is parsley. This weekend, as I was caring for my parsley, I kept thinking of the dish that my husband's co-worker had made for us. She made Tabouli which is a fresh and delicious Middle Eastern/ Mediterranean salad. This salad is wonderful when you want to eat healthier and it is perfect for summer, so keep the recipe handy for when the tomatoes and cucumbers ripen. There are many variations of this recipe, so I altered one to make it similar to the dish that we were given.

TABOULI

1 cup water, boiling

1 cup fine cracked wheat (bulgur)-I found mine in the health food section- (Bob's Red Mill)

- 1 cup minced fresh parsley leaves
- 5 large fresh mint leaves, minced
- green onions, finely chopped/sliced
- 3 tomatoes, diced

2 cucumber or one large Eng-

- 3 tablespoons olive oil
- 3 tablespoons lemon juice, or
- 1 teaspoon sea salt or kosher salt

In a large mixing bowl, pour the water over the cracked wheat and cover, let stand about 20 minutes until wheat is tender and water is absorbed. Add the chopped herbs and vegetables and toss with the mix. Combine the oil, lemon juice and salt in a separate bowl. Add to wheat mixture and mix well. Chill. Serve and enjoy.

Note: Eat Tabouli with crisp hearts of romaine lettuce leaves or serve as a side dish.
