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ROADS MUST BE PRIORITY



FIXING SACRAMENTO COUNTY ROADS MUST **BE A PRIORITY** By Supervisor Rosario Rodriguez

Since taking office in January, I've had countless conversations with residents across Sacramento County who are fed up with the condition of our roadsand I don't blame them. From crumbling pavement to massive potholes, our infrastructure is showing its age. This is not just an inconvenience. It's a safety issue, and one that I am committed to addressing head-on.

The scale of the problem is significant. Our current deferred maintenance backlog for county roads is nearly \$1.4 billion, and that number continues to grow each year we fail to act. To put it into perspective, Sacramento County's average pavement condition score sits at a dismal 41 out of 100. We currently invest about \$30 million annually in road repairs, but experts say we need at least \$60 million per year just to keep the problem from getting worse.

Importantly, Sacramento County is the only jurisdiction in the region that contributes General Fund dollars toward fixing roads. In the current budget, that contribution is \$20 million, with the remaining \$10 million coming from other sources like state and federal transportation funds. That General Fund investment shows how seriously we take this issue-but even with it, we're still playing catchup.

Some have suggested a new lo-

cal tax measure to address the shortfall, but I'm approaching that idea with caution. Time and again, we've seen these measures fail at the ballot box, and with good reason. Instead of focusing squarely on repairing our roads, past proposals have spread funding across a wide array of projects like bike lanes and public transit. While I absolutely believe those components have their place in a healthy transportation network, they don't reflect what the majority of residents are asking for right now. When voters are told they're paying to fix roads, the money needs to go to fixing roads-not to projects policymakers think the public should want.

In the meantime, I want residents to know that we are taking immediate action where we can. Potholes reported to the County are typically filled within days-sometimes sooner. If you see one, I encourage you to call 311, or reach out to my office directly. We'll make sure the right crew gets dispatched quickly. It might not solve our long-term challenges, but it does make a difference in the day-today lives of our residents.

The reality is that we didn't get into this situation overnight, and we won't get out of it overnight either. But make no mistakethis is one of my top priorities. I will continue to push for smarter, more effective investments in our infrastructure, and I'll make sure your voices are heard as we shape the future of transportation in Sacramento County.

We all want safe, smooth, and reliable roads. With the right focus and the political will to follow through, I believe we can get there.


Boards and Commissions (Orangevale/Fair Oaks) Leadership in your community doesn't start with a title--it starts with showing up. Be it county, school or special district, you can step directly into local leadership by applying to serve on public boards and commissions ---or simply by showing up and commenting at their meetings.

Public boards and commissions help shape local policy, review projects and advise elected officials. From zoning to education, public health to neighborhood planning, these advisory bodies provide residents a direct way to influence decisions that guide their community's future. Often, the only requirement is showing up and being a resident.

"Communities are stronger when their leaders are connected" has become my favorite borrowed phrase. And communities are mighty when residents are connected to their leaders.

"Boards and commissions have existed for years, and they cover a range of issues-literally from birth to death," said Vanessa Mc-Carthy-Olmstead, chief of staff to Sacramento County Supervisor Rich Desmond. "From First 5 services to Cemetery Districts, there should be something that appeals to everyone."

Each commission typically advises elected officials or county departments. Members weigh in on issues, share expertise, review proposals, and elevate public concerns. "They're your neighbors," McCarthy-Olmstead said. "They understand how proposals impact the community and how neighbors feel. They volunteer because they **Continue on page 9**

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Orangevale Fire Department 1959 – Present

In the last issue of the Orangevale View we covered the fire department history through 1955. This article looks at the changes in the last 65 years. The department currently provides outstanding service to our community.

1959 – A \$520 resuscitator was added to emergency equipment housed permanently at the Orangevale Fire Station. It was a gift from the Orangevale Lions Club purchased from funds raised during a motorcycle race.

March 1964 - The Citrus Height Fire District commissioners were considering two new fire stations for the Orangevale area. One station ended up being built at Hickory Avenue and was later moved to Greenback Lane , which is still used today as Station 29 (8681 Greenback Lane). Another was built at Chestnut Avenue and remains used today as Station 22 (6248 Chestnut Avenue). Upon completing this station, the one at Greenback and Pecan was closed.

pi Bar opened as part of the Fair Oaks Fire District (Station 3 and later renumbered to 33) to primarily service the Rollingwood area, but due to budget issues, it was closed in 2009. For a brief period in 2012, the station was operated by the Bureau of Land Management to house and train military veterans in firefighting techniques. They focused primarily on wildland fire suppression and fuels management.

Main Avenue near Mississip-

December 1979 - An arsonist sweeps through Orangevale, including Redeemer Covenant, First United Methodist, Christ the King Lutheran churches and Green Oaks Elementary School. No injuries, but the fires did cause combined damage estimated at \$400,000. A reward of \$3,000 was pledged for information leading to the arrest and conviction of the perpetrators.

June 1989 - Citrus Heights Fire District merged with North Highlands, followed by Rancho Cordova, to streamline operations and allow revenue to be redistributed within the new, larger district, which would be known as Sacramento County Fire Protection District. Orangevale's two fire stations (22 and 29) were included in the consolidation. The new name on a

fire station might read Sacramento Fire Protection District Orangevale Station No. 22. The new district would include 17 stations serving a 130-square-mile area with a population of 275,000. The district would be able to redirect funds to allow for the upgrading of staff levels, bringing most firefighters to full-time status. Other priorities included equipment repairs, new fire stations in Citrus Heights and Rancho Cordova, and a planned new station on Kenneth Avenue and Greenback Lane in Fair Oaks.

January - December 2000 - The Sacramento Metropolitan Fire District is established by reorganization of the two largest fire districts. First, a series of mergers dating back to 1945 started with the Citrus Heights Fire Protection District and Orangevale Volunteer Fire Department merging. In 1984, North Highlands was merged in, and five years later, Rancho Cordova joined the group, which grew to the size of 275.5 square miles. Fair Oaks Fire District was added in 1993.

The second of the Sacramento County Districts, which were absorbed by the American River Fire District in earlier mergers, included the Arden, Carmichael, Arcade, Rio Linda-Elverta Sloughhouse, and Florin districts. The new Sacramento Metropolitan Fire District would serve a population of 596,257 people and cover 417 square miles. In all, 16 districts (662 full-time employees) would be consolidated into one to serve more than one-third of the Sacramento County area. When an emergency call is made, a crew from either district could respond, depending on the location.

2005 – Station 29 is proposed to be moved from 6314

Hickory to 8681 Greenback Lane where a new building could be 10 times larger. accommodate modern fire equipment, and address the privacy needs of women firefighters. The Orangevale station on Hickory Avenue was originally designed as a single-family home and had three bedrooms and one back-in garage that could only accommodate one 1978 Seagrave pumper, which was difficult to maintain. In addition, it did not meet seismic safety standards or current building codes.

The estimated cost to complete a new 13,000-squarefoot Orangevale station was \$6.5 million and would cover about 5 acres. The new station would have dormitories to accommodate 10 staff members, an emergency power generator, three drivethrough bays to hold several pieces of firefighting equipment, a medical unit, and special equipment to fight grass fires.

Back in 1935, as told in our first segment, an S.O.C. (Save Our Cow) rescue was made by the Orangevale volunteer fire department to get a cow that was wedged in the crotch of a tree out. Then 80 years later, in 2015, Sac Metro Firefighters rescued a horse that got stuck in a bathtub. Phantom, the 30-year-old horse, was dancing around her stall protecting her food trough (bathtub) when she suddenly fell in and was stuck with her feet in the air for about 25 minutes. Between firefighters and the owner's family, they were able to prop the bathtub on its side and pull Phantom forward onto her feet. Phantom, a Palomino/Appaloosa mix, was not injured.

While no changes to fire stations within Orangevale have been made since 2005, rest assured that the service of our local firefighters is the best. Whenever the opportunity arises, I hope you will join me in thanking them for their service.

I want to thank Captain Randy Wootton, Historian for the Sacramento Metropolitan Fire District, for his insight and help confirming and correcting my research, where needed. I can't believe that my husband, Don, keeps finding new recipes for the Instant Pot. This is one of my new favorites! Serve it as a main dish with some rice or potatoes and a veggie. For leftovers you can use it for a salad or make burritos with it!

DON'S EASY THIGHS

1.5 pounds boneless, skinless chicken thighs- approx. 6 thighs 1 tsp dried oregano 1 tsp paprika 1 tsp garlic powder $\frac{1}{2}$ tsp onion powder ¹/₂ tsp coarse Kosher salt ¹/₄ tsp black pepper 1 TBSP olive oil

1. In a small bowl, combine the spices. Rub this mixture over all sides of the thighs.

2. Pour the olive oil into the instant pot inner pot and press the "sauté" button to turn on sauté mode. Once the oil is hot, spread it over the bottom of the pot. Carefully place the seasoned chicken thighs in the pot. Cook about 4 minutes per side, until

both sides are browned. Remove chicken to a clean plate.

3. Turn off the Instant Pot and pour 1 cup of water in the inner pot. Use a spoon to scrape up any browned bits on the bottom of the pot. This will ensure that you do not get a "burn warning" during the pressure-cooking process.

4. Place the metal trivet in the Instant Pot. Put the thighs on top of the trivet. 5. Close the Instant Pot lid and turn on the steam release valve to the sealing position.

6. Press the Manual/Pressure Cook button and cook on high pressure for 8 minutes. The Instant Pot will take about 5 minutes to reach pressure and the cook time will begin counting down. When the Pot beeps a few times to let vou know that the cooking time has finished, allow the pressure to release naturally for 5 minutes (just leave the Pot alone.)

7. Then carefully turn the steam release valve to the venting position to release any remaining pressure. When the float valve drops down, carefully open the Instant Pot lid. Using an instant read thermometer, check that the chicken has reached 165 degrees.

8. Serve with rice or potatoes and a veggie. Enjoy. Save the leftovers for salad or burritos!

Contnued from page 5 care deeply about their community." Get Involved, One Step at a Time The easiest way to start is by attending a public meeting. Most local legislative bodies, including boards and commissions, are open to the public under California's Ralph M. Brown Act. Agendas must be posted in advance and include public comment. Many meetings are also livestreamed or archived online. Ideas and concerns can be shared directly with commission members or during public comment-even if not on the agenda. Speakers are often referred to the appropriate department for follow-up or may have their item agenized for future discussion.

Those passionate about a board's work can get directly involved-Sacramento County lists over 80 appointed boards and commissions. with vacancies and application details available online.

Serving on a public board or commission not only gives residents a voice, but also builds leadership experience, strengthens community ties, and fosters a deeper understanding of how local government works.

"We want people to feel welcomed, not overwhelmed," said Matt Hedges, chief of staff to Sacramento County Supervisor Rosario Rodriguez. "To get passionate people involved with what they care about most."

Hedges encourages interested residents to call the office of the commission or agency they're interested in. "We try to make it easy. Our staff can discuss your interests and help match you with the right opportunity."

The School Connection

Local school districts also offer advisory roles. San Juan Unified, for example, has five standing committees open to parents and community members, including facilities, bond oversight, curriculum and instruction, special education, and the Local Control and Accountability Plan Continue on page 16

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
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Orangevale Chamber of Commerce Business Spotlight:

The Orangevale Chamber of Commerce along with the Fair Oaks Chamber proudly celebrated the grand opening of Creative Spirit Learning Center's second location in Fair Oaks with a well attended ribbon-cutting ceremony. 


(LCAP) advisory committee. Committee members serve twoyear terms and provide input on district resource allocation and priorities, reviewing proposals before they reach the Board of Education. Applicants are appointed by their area board member and can apply online. These meetings are also public, with dates, agendas, and vacancies posted on the district website. Sometimes the district reaches out to the community when forming committees for specific needs, such as curriculum adoption or input on a new policy draft

Participation Is The Key

You don't need to run for office to shape your community's future. You just need to participate. Serving on a board or commission shows how one person can make a differenceby listening, showing up, and bringing a local voice to the conversation. "There's almost an infinite amount of volunteer capacity in a community," says Hedges. "The problem isn't a lack of people-it's a lack of awareness."

The seats are there. The meetings are open. All that's left is for someone like you to take the next step and bring your skills and perspective - or perhaps simply sharing an idea - in a commission or board you are passionate about. 
