TWO ORANGEVALE ATHLETES NAMED ALL-AMERICAN IN WATER POLO

Two athletes from Orangevale have earned national recognition from NISCA for their excellence in the pool. Brooke Boyer and Lucy Nihart were recently named to the prestigious All-American water polo team, a distinction awarded to only a select group of 100 high school players nationwide.

Boyer, a Granite Bay High School graduate now attending American River College, received the honor for the second time. She also earned the California-Hawaii

All-American award, underscoring her impact on the sport. At just 5 feet 4 inches tall - in a position typically filled by taller, bigger athletes, Boyer has relied on her determination and heart to stand out as one of the best.

"Receiving this award for a second time really means a lot to me," she said. "Not very many players are chosen, and being able to make an impact on the water polo community in Sacramento and at Granite Bay High School is really important to me."

Nihart, a senior at Granite Bay High School, is making her first mark on the All-American list. Currently competing in tournaments with her team, she reflected on the recognition during a trip to Arroyo Grande, where a pre-game tradition includes swimming in the ocean.

"It feels like an honor to be nominated for this award and to win," she said. "My goals for the future are to play in college and continue working hard. My biggest support system is my parents, and I want to thank them for everything they've done for me."

The honors come on the heels of a history-making season for Granite Bay girls water polo, which last year won the Division I championship for the first time in three decades. Head Coach, Tyson Frenn, described the moment as the culmination of years of work.

"It was incredible. It's been our goal since I started at Granite Bay nine years ago. I credit all the teams that came before the 2024 team who steadily built up the level of the program year after year. We've played Davis in the championship game four years in a row and it took the fourth time to finally get over the hump. The team really came together in preseason. They had an amazing bond and it showed in their play. 29-4, best season in program history. Magical is the best way to describe it."

For Orangevale, the achievements of Boyer and Nihart are a reminder of the talent and determination growing in the local community. We wish them the best in the future.

Unraveling Prop 50 – Which Vote Actually Preserves Representation in Government

As your sample ballot sits on your counter, you've likely been bombarded by ads, both sides claiming their way will preserve representation in government. The other side is rigging future elections. But which side is truly fighting for the people's voice? A closer look at Proposition 50 reveals a concerning trend.

A Foundation of Representation: The United States congress – the House of Representatives – was designed to protect representation by the people, not just the states. The framers of the constitution understood that each community has unique needs, sentiments, and values. They knew each community – not just each state - would need a voice to ensure the voice of the people was the strongest voice in the political structure of our government. Congressional districts are meant to represent the makeup of that community; designed to keep our diverse voice vibrant and effective. Designed to keep our checks and balances in place.

California's Progress: Until 2010, California's district boundaries, like most of the country, were drawn by politicians, often disregarding community identities. However, through Proposition 11 and 20, Californians established an independent redistricting commission, with strict direction to keep "communities of interest" together in a single district whenever possible, becoming the third state to do. There

are now 10 states with such public oversight.

Prop 50: A Step Backwards? Prop 50 proposes a temporary constitutional amendment to suspend independent redistricting and give authority back to the state legislature. Unlike the commission, the legislature-drawn map is not required to follow the state-level standards. The proposed map intentionally divides communities of interest to create more Democratic seats in Congress.

Proponent say it's leveling the playing field. Texas's legislature recently did the same thing – drawing district lines favoring Republicans. Legislation that is already being challenged in federal courts as unconstitutional.

From a human – not a party based – perspective, this trend is concerning.

Further accelerating the rise of party politics and will bring fall to the voice of the people. If Texas has done wrong - elevating Political Party over People – replicating the same thing in California will only magnify it. And so will any other state that jumps on the bandwagon. This country was not built on the interests of political parties. It was built on preserving the interests, opportunities and pursuits of it's People.

The Legal System Is Already at Work - Our government's third Check and Balance The same legal system that upheld independent redistricting when it was first proposed by Arizona's proposition 106 in 2000, is even now challenging Texas's actions. This is a crucial check on power, ensuring that our democracy remains representative.

Rise above Fear. The Prop 50 campaigns are running of fear, as parties wrestle for power. We will never restore balance through decisions made by fear. We are a government by the people, for the people.

Californians now have the obligation to rise above the fear. What we do now will set a precedence. One state repressing the voice of it's people should not lead to another state repressing the voice of it's people. There is danger is perpetuating an unrepresentative government.

In my view – No on Prop 50 is a vote for the people.

Consider the above. Read the full ballot. If you share this concern, unite with others who are walking and talking. Time is short. You can make a difference. And vote No on 50.

HISTORY PROJECT

Earl McNeely, Prominent Orangevale Resident (1898-1971) Part 2

At the end of the last newsletter McNeely had been traded to a couple of other teams and ended up back with the Sacramento Solons in 1932.

When Buddy Ryan resigned as manager of the Solons in August 1932, Earl is appointed to take over managerial duties, and in a little over a month, he leads the team up to the first division.

In 1934, longtime owner Lew Moreing was unable to repay a loan on which he had pledged the Solons as collateral. The bank foreclosed on Moreing and then sold the Solons to Earl for \$135,000. That purchase made McNeely, at 35, the nation's youngest owner of a top-level minor league team. He stayed on as manager, team president, treasurer, and business manager. Due to the Great Depression, attendance was down, and the ticket prices and players' salaries did little to help pay the bills. After another bad season in 1935, McNeely and a representative of another bank, to which he owed the balance of his purchase, went to the annual minor league meeting and sold off all the players they had under contract.


Earl accepted an offer to become the third base coach of the Washington Senators in 1936 and turned over what was left of the Solons to the St. Louis Cardinals. Earl coached for two seasons in Washington and was let go. By 1937, he was done with baseball.

He returned to Orangevale and entered the dried fruit business (primarily prunes). He and Ethel had their only child, a daughter, Carol Ann, in 1939. He also raised cattle on his farm, dabbled in real estate, and became active in local affairs, including joining the volunteer fire department and serving as president of the Orangevale school board.

In the 1940s, Earl became director of the new Fair Oaks Cooperative Olive Marketing Association and was the potentate of Ben Ali Temple, as well as a reappointed member of the Shrine Crippled Children's Hospital Endowment Committee. He served as sergeant-at-arms of the Sacramento County grand jury and was president of both the Lions Club and the

board of trustees of the newly unified Roberts and Orangevale school districts. After 18 years of ownership, he sold his home on the corner of Greenback & Pecan (the old Calder house).

In the 1950s, Earl announced the formation of Sacramento County's first Soil Conservation District, which would provide aid in formulating and working out soil conservation projects. Earl is elected presi-



dent. Governor Earl Warren appointed Earl McNeely to the board of directors of the Sacramento County Fair, and he served as chairman of the Folsom Pioneer Festival. He would continue to serve as president of the Sacramento County Fair Board for 6 years. He was also chairman of the Committee for the reelection of Assemblyman Gordon A. Fleury of the 8th district. One of his proudest achievements was his role in establishing American River Junior College (ARJC) in 1955. He served as a founding member of the college's board. ARJC grew to be one of the largest two-year colleg-

es in California. He was also the Director of the Orangevale Water District. He retired from business in 1959 and became an avid golfer.

In the 1960s, Earl not only continued his role as president of the Sacramento County Fair Board, but in early 1964, he announced his intention to seek the county supervisor seat for the fourth district. This supervisor race became known as "Battle of In-Laws" when Earl's brother-in-law, Lloyd Greenhalgh, announced his intention to also run. In addition to Lloyd, six additional candidates were in the running – Eugene T. Gualco, William E. White, Jack K. Corbett, Jim H. Cronkite, Hugh E. Kennedy, and W.W. Woods. Earl vowed to devote his full time to the job, and his platform included honesty and integrity in government, roads and transportation, recreation, planning and zoning, contracts and appointments, taxation, and communication. This may have been the first time a candidate offered free rides to people without transportation. While Earl did not win the race, he was very gracious in writing thank-you notes to members of the community in many local papers.

Also in the 60s, Earl was a Rotarian, Shriner, Mason, and member of the VFW. In 1966, he was appointed to the Board of Commissioners of the Citrus Heights Fire District and served as President through 1968. In 1966, he was inducted into Sacramento's Sports Hall of Fame.

After a lengthy illness, at the age of 73, G. Earl McNeely died of lung cancer on July 16, 1971, and was buried at Mount Vernon Park.

After Earl's passing, the 80-year-old packing shed and dehydrator were torn down in 1975.

Earl's wife, Ethel Mae McNeely, passed away on

March 6, 1992, at the age of 90 and was laid to rest next to Earl at Mount Vernon. Remembrances in her name were requested for The Villa Restoration Fund and Serve Our Seniors of Orangevale.

During his lifetime, he returned to Washington three times to participate in reunions of the 1924 World Series champions. Every October, while the World Series is playing out and stories are told, Earl's role in the 1924 championship is bound to be heard and mentioned in papers across the United States.

Apple Cake

Ingredients:

- 3 lg eggs
- 1 1/2 c sugar
- 1 c oil
- 2 c flour
- 4 tsp cinnamon
- 1 tsp soda
- 1/2 tsp salt
- 2 tsp vanilla extract
- 4 c thinly sliced cut apples (about 5 med.)

Directions:

1. In a large bowl beat the eggs on high speed with a hand mixer until mixed well, add the sugar and oil and beat well.

2. Mix the flour, cinnamon, soda and salt together and add to the creamed batter. Add the vanilla.

3. Butter a 13x9" pan and spread the sliced apples on the bottom; Pour the batter over top of the apples and spread out evenly to cover all the apples.

4. Bake @ 350° for 1 hr. or until tooth pick inserted in the center of the cake comes out clean. Top should be a pale golden and apples should be tender. Remove from the oven and let cool. It is yummy just like this or you can serve with ice cream or whipped cream.

BOYS STATE AND GIRLS STATE.

The American Legion and the American Legion Auxiliary establish the Boys State Program in 1937. A Few years later, in 1940, the American Legion Auxiliary introduced the Girls State Program. In 2023 the American Legion Boys State became a co-educational and is now known as Boys/Girls State. This will be our 89th session. The sessions are held here locally at Sacramento State. Dates re usually the last two weeks in June.

Both Boys/Girls State and Girls State are highly respected summer leadership and Citizenship initiative designed for high school juniors. Participants are organized into cities, counties and state emulating the struc-

ture of government. They are further divided into two political Parties, where they collaborate to develop party platforms and elect officials.

These programs feature a variety of activities, including legislative sessions, court proceedings and other civic functions that closely resemble real government operations. These experiences aim to provide participants with firsthand knowledge of how government works.

The primary objective of the Boys/Girls State and Girls State programs is to foster informed and engaged citizens who understand their rights and responsibilities. Participants gain an understanding of democratic processes, develop leadership skills, and learn the significance of civic involvement.

The Boys/Girls State and Girls

State programs provided invaluable experiences for high school juniors preparing them for future leadership roles in their communities and beyond.

The American Legion Fair Oaks Post 383, American Legion Auxiliary 383 and Folsom Post 362 have been sending young men and women from Bella Vista, Casa Roble, Folsom High Vista Del Lago, Oak Ridge, Mira Loma, and Sacramento Day School. Providing Life Foundations Guided by Community Support

How a Volunteer-Led Nonprofit Is Reshaping Reentry in Orangevale and Citrus Heights

For over a decade, Peacemakers Love Foundation Good Cause Sacramento (PLFGCS) has quietly transformed lives across Orangevale, Citrus Heights, and surrounding communities—through compassion, structure, and a deep belief in second chances.

Founded in 2013 by Malcolm Johnson, PLFGCS remains strictly volunteer-led, powered by individuals who share not only their time, but their lived experience navigating trauma, recovery, and reentry. Malcolm's leadership is rooted in life dedication—a calling shaped by personal transformation and a commitment to serve others with dignity, accountability, and love. This spirit flows through every aspect of PLFGCS, where volunteers lead with empathy, not ego, and healing is a shared journey.

Two Homes, One Mission

PLFGCS operates two gender-specific transitional homes: one for women in Orangevale, and one for men in Citrus Heights. Each home offers a clean, affordable, safe, and sober environment where residents can begin again.

Guests may stay for 3 to 24 months—or longer if needed—based on individual goals and progress. It's a "grow or go" process, built on the principle of: People helping people help themselves.

At PLFGCS, healing doesn't come from handouts—it comes from hands held out in support, paired with personal responsibility. Residents are not passive recipients of care. They are active participants in their

own transformation.

Volunteers—many of whom have walked similar paths—offer guidance, structure, and encouragement, but never enable. The communal living environment becomes a practice ground for independence, employment, and emotional growth.

As Malcolm often says: "If we have to do more work than you, it's not going to work."

The Empowerment Workshop

At the heart of PLFGCS's model is a mandatory 12-week Empowerment Workshop, a trauma-informed curriculum designed to rebuild the spiritual, mental, and physical foundation of each participant.

Topics include:

- Intentional Living
- Effective Communication
- Emotional Regulation
- Spiritual Wealth
- Conflict Resolution
- Self-Love and Boundaries
- Co-Dependency and Healthy Relationships
- Relapse Awareness
- Nutrition and Holistic Wellness

Residents are taught to embrace "The Four Agreements" as a daily practice:

- Be Impeccable with Your Word Towards Yourself and Others
- Don't Take Things Personally
- Don't Make Assumptions
- Always Do Your Best (even if your best is 1% today—and that's okay)

This philosophy creates a no-blame, no-judgment environment where individuals are seen as already whole—experiencing their perfect journey toward becoming the best version of themselves.

Nutrition is also a key part of the restoration process. While meals are not shared communally, residents are taught how food impacts mood, energy, and emotional regulation. Nutrition education is woven

into the Empowerment Workshop, helping participants make informed choices that support their healing and long-term wellness.

A Resident's Journey

When I arrived, I had nothing but my car—and I was living in it. I was told to 'sit still,' and for the first time in a long time, I did. I stayed at the women's home for 12 months and focused on rebuilding myself. I took the time to get stable, secured a job, and didn't rush the process. With support and structure, I was able to move into my own apartment and regain custody of my children—something that once felt impossible. It all happened within a year. This place didn't just give me shelter—it gave me a foundation. I'll always call it my family and my home away from home."

VANDALISM THREATENS SAFETY AND BEAUTY OF OVPARKS



Vandalism Threatens Safety and Beauty of OVParks

Park vandalism is more than just an eyesore – it presents safety hazards, causes facility/amenity closures, and costs the community money. OVParks had a wonderful summer in many ways, with over 900 swim lessons taught, a successful 8-weeks of Rec'ing Crew Day Camp, and almost 100 participants in our free Jr Giants program. The park district sponsored the Tropical Escape event, and provided facilities for other exciting happenings

including Summer Palooza and Orangevale's weekly Farmers Market. With that, an excessive amount of resources were also spent mitigating the effects of park vandalism.

This year, 2 of our playgrounds were significantly damaged, forcing OVParks staff to replace the slide at Norma Hamlin Park and fully remove the tall spiral slide at Orangevale Community Park. All damages were caused by acts of vandalism. This resulted in significant financial impact, and the permanent outcome of destroying the long-standing favorite slide at Orangevale Community Park.



Electric and motorized bikes are not allowed on decomposed granite (DG) trails nor dirt trails throughout the Orangevale park system. Still, this summer OVPark staff could not keep up with the on-going damage these vehicles caused to our trails. This form of vandalism accelerates erosion, creating a significant safety hazard pedestrians and limiting ADA access to our parks.

At Almond Park, the District has been making further efforts to communicate that dogs are required to be on-leash throughout the park. This has been an ongoing struggle, so additional signage has been added within the park. These signs are continuously damaged by vandalism, costing the District more money and staff time – which means costing the community tax dollars. Throughout our parks, there has been an increase in graffiti, tree damage, and restroom vandalism. Correcting these forms of vandalism absorbs valuable community resources.

As a member of the Orangevale Community, you may be asking "How can I help?" Here is how you can help your park district protect your parks:

- Educate: Make sure your friends, family, neighbors, and kids all know that vandalism is not welcome in this community.
- Report: If you see vandalism taking place, call the police immediately.
- Document: Take photographs of vandals and share any information you have with both police and the OVParks District.
- Reach-out: Share any information about vandalism with OVParks at info@ovparks.com

Let's work together to minimize vandalism in our parks and keep Orangevale safe and beautiful.
